- d. Massachusetts has a system in place to pay for interpreters who are deaf and hard of hearing
- e. Colorado has law that requires any person who is ordered by court to go to AA meeting is required to have interpreting services paid for
  - i. If not court ordered or on voluntary basis, not sure how that is paid or if there is a system
- f. Want to have a similar system to look into system wide issues for who could pay for these services
  - ii. Department of Health
- g. Systematic problem
  - iii. Provider needs to know how to pay for services
- h. Steve Florio happy to look into it
- i. Need to have expanded definition of what is medical services
- j. AA meetings, consumer education programs
- k. Issue is who is going to pay for it
- l. Which category of insurance should pay for it?
- m. Already a federal law that requires that service providers make accommodations, but then becomes a payment issues
- n. Pretty low incidence so often put aside for larger priorities
- o. Should figure out what is the best system for this small state

15, 16, 18	Interpreters at ancillary healthcare programs for individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing	Provide interpreter services for ancillary healthcare programs or supports and the Commission on the Deaf and Hard of Hearing will assist with these services including Alocoholic Anonymous meetings.
46, 47, 62	Services for the uninsured	Make information on how to access charity care (The Point, United Way, etc.) more accessible.
62	Customer Service for Medicaid is inadequate	Have continuing professional development, specifically with disability sensitivity.

2. Affordable Care Act

- a. Not anything that could be done on our end
- b. Concern was having trouble getting Medicaid in Florida to close out paperwork
- c. Was having issues transferring to Rhode Island

- d. Call someone at a federal level for assistance with that
- 3. Blue Cross/Blue Shield
  - a. Not covering the medication needed to stay out of the wheel chair
  - b. Not necessarily subject to state rules since is a Medicare and private insurance company
  - c. Many are regulation concerns instead of legislative action
- 4. Confidentiality
  - a. Issue with limit on how much she can earn with working and still receive her benefits
- 5. Donut Hole
  - a. Not too much that can be done about this
- 6. Family Opportunity Act
  - a. About the Medicaid buy-in legislation
  - b. Gives the states the ability for the Medicaid buy-in act
- 7. Medicaid
  - a. Medicaid transfer issue – contact the state legislators
  - b. Are provisions around charity care that provide access to people who are adults with children at home
  - c. Not well publicized
  - d. Felt that Medicaid wasn't customer friendly
- 8. Physicians
  - a. Physicians do not have the knowledge necessary for rare disorder
  - b. Do have medical transition program at RI hospital for med/peds group
    - i. Certified pediatric and adult medicine
    - ii. Does try to find resources and link people up
  - c. Concern about finding specialists in the area
    - i. How to find the appropriate physicians?
  - d. Already giving out information at secondary IEPs and at pediatrician offices
- 9. Post Operation
  - a. Up to hospital to decide if going to rehab facilities/post-op plans
- 10. Social Security
  - a. Question on what is the criteria to get social security
- 11. Social Security Disability Income
  - a. How to reapply for SSDI
- 12. Supplemental Security Income
  - a. First person was referred to the Sherlock Center
  - b. Medicaid-buy in
